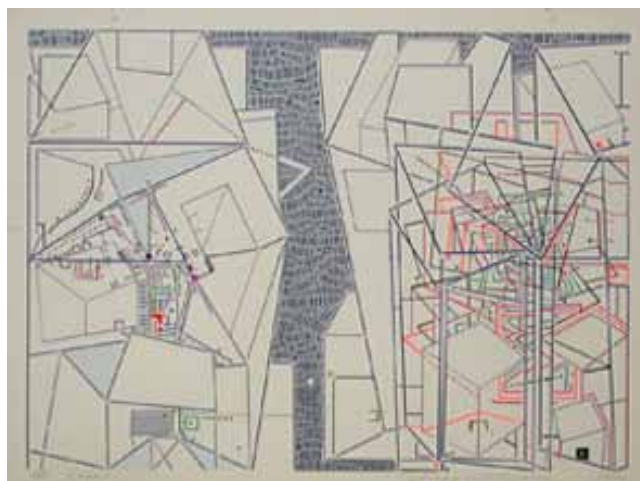

Abstract Art — a broad term that generally encompasses non-representational works — is largely viewed as a modern invention. Romanticists, Impressionists and Expressionists of the 19th century began playing with form and color to achieve a reconstructed view of the natural and to emphasize mood and emotion over verisimilitude and representation. These concepts continued to shape art movements of the early-20th century as some artists built upon the ideas while others rejected them in protest. Born out of Cubism, Fauvism and Surrealism, Abstract Art emerged during the mid-20th century and evolved quickly, branching into several sub-genres, including Abstract Expressionism, Lyrical Abstraction and Geometric Abstraction.

Into Abstraction highlights a half century of abstract artworks from differing sub-genres collected by the Dorsky family. The exhibition is a snapshot of the evolution of Abstract Art showcasing works from several well-known modern and contemporary artists such as Dorothy Dehner, Richard Hunt, Willem de Kooning, Roberto Matta and Joan Miró.
